CELEBRATE

AT ST PAUL'S

Sun, warmth and mangoes – this is my favourite season. The Christmas and New Year's break tends to slow time down while family gatherings, gifts and celebrations give us the opportunity to be generous. Or, prodigal.

When we think "prodigal" it's often a "prodigal son" that comes to mind. It's someone who went to the dark side but has now returned - or. we hope they will. "Prodigal", though, is much richer. To be sure "prodiaal" has been used for millennia to describe the younger son in Luke 15. He did go a little wild and he was brought home. "Prodigal" however, does not refer to any of this. "Prodigal" highlights the son's reckless and extravagant spending.

This kind of expenditure is not limited to the younger son in Jesus' story. The father is also extraordinarily reckless. He is the prodigal – even more than the younger son. He bore the humiliation that comes when a son takes half the family-purse and wishes you were dead.

He paid a shame-filled price when, leas bared, he ran to areet his wayward son BEFORE anyone in the town got to his son to beat him. More than this, the father paid handsomely when the older son - the one who never strayed at all - refused to welcome his uouna brother home. The father then walks another path of shame when he publicly walks out to his older son, implores him to join the celebration, and offers that son his hand. The father is the prodigal. He is the recklessly extravagant one.

What's more, in him we see the Heavenly Father thinly veiled.

It is our Heavenly Father, the Christian God, who is THE prodigal: his son, also. The parallels are clear. They bore the humiliation to save us. Jesus bore the shame of our sin when he became sin for us so he could welcome us Home. As a result, we who were once far off have not only been called home but we have been given a phenomenal privilege. We get to call the Holy God, "Father". His is an extraordinarily, reckless generosity. Celebrate the birth of Christ – the prodigal – therefore!

Let the prodigal God capture your heart. Thank and worship him. Take another step to be like him. Be a prodigal yourself. Embrace the wild ones. Welcome those who are, for whatever reason, far from you. Be generous by using everything the prodigal God has placed in your hands to enrich others. Who knows...you may discover a joy otherwise not known. And someone else may just discover our Father and our Lord Jesus will welcome them Home, too.

May you be refreshed in body, mind, soul, spirit and heart over the Christmas/New Year.

NORM & JANELLE

Serving in Marsabit, Kenya

We had a great chance to catch up with Norm and Janelle at a recent CMS Function in Sydney, where they spoke of the joys and challenges of their mission. Janelle praised God's amazing goodness to them in the 11/2 years they have been back in Kenya and gave thanks for the faithful support from supporters in Australia. She has been developing literacy material and reading the Bible in the Boran language with local women.

Janelle has focussed on working in the Sagante Parish. (This is a link to Janelle's My Marsabit power point) The area is Muslimdominated and girls go to a local Madrassa at an early age where they study the Koran and learn Arabic.

Marsabit is a massive area extending from the northern border down almost to Mt Kenya in the middle of the country. As Islam is the dominant religion and is growing, a big challenge of Norm's work is how he engages in teamwork with local Pastors and how to equip Christians not only to stand strong against intimidation from Muslims, who accuse them of corrupting the Bible and believing in three gods, but also to equip Christians to share Christ courageously with their Muslim neighbors. For some months, a list has been in circulation offering a bounty for the killing of white Christian missionaries and giving specifics as to where to obtain weapons, how to arrange payment etc.

This year when a Sheikh in Marsabit was arrested for recruiting and radicalizing children and youth, many of his followers rioted attacking the Police station and a church. **Tribal Clashes** - Marsabit County Tribal clashes started on 5th September just outside of Marsabit and escalated during October with 14 killed and houses burned and many people fleeing their homes in fear. Bishop Qampicha and his wife Safi hosted many Boran displaced people and next door, Provost Mark Kargi and his wife opened their home to give refuge to mang Gabbra who were fleeing the clashes.

Both Bishop Qampicha and the Provost Ven Mark Kargi played a key role in peace talks. We thank God for them and for all who were agents of peace and for our Lord, Saviour and Shepherd who is the Prince of Peace. Norm and fellow Christians have recently been doing missions. Norm and Janelle thank God that there is now peace, please pray it continues and Christians take the opportunity to share the Good News of Peace with God through Christ.

At a recent mission at a community near Idido, Norm and the team assisted with the burial of one of the elders and later were able to share the Good News of Christ's victory over death.

Norm is keen to prioritise discipleship and in teamwork with Bishop Qampicha and Pastors empower and equip Christians to be Disciple making Disciples.



The clashes occurred in communities like Idido where

Compassion are doing a good work in the North and Norm and the Mission team run training for those teaching the children.

There are plans to make theological training available through Moore College and African Enterprise to better equip Christian leaders in the area. Norm and Janelle are thankful for our partnership with them in their work and encouraged us to sign up for their news and prayer letter.
