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# HOW TO USE THIS BOOKLET

At St Paul's we are committed to growing as disciples of Jesus, spurring each other on to know and grow in Jesus. We know that God works through His Word powerfully to teach and transform us. We therefore know the importance of seeing God's Word regularly sown into our lives, through our sermon series and also during the week.

We see this process as we daily open God's Word and depend on Him in prayer. We also grow as we meet in our households and study groups to read God's Word together.

Over time we've seen that as we study the passage from God's Word together, that God builds depth in our understanding, stronger application in our lives, and encouragement in our households and church as we learn together.

As we together dig into the idea of Apologetics this term, we are exploring the concepts in at least three ways...

#### CHURCH

Keep this guide with your Bible and bring it with you to church or keep it handy when you watch church online. Scribble down sermon notes in the space provided. Then, be ready to reflect on these personally, as you meet with someone 1:1, and as you meet up with your small group.

### **SMALL GROUPS**

Take this guide with you to your small group each week. There are Bible studies for each topic within the Challenging Christianity series, with space to write down your answers plus prayer points that arise from the study and prayer requests from the members of your group.

#### **FAMILY DEVOTIONS**

Use your family devotions time to open up the concept of Apologetics or Questions people have together as a household (keeping the devotions suitable for a range of ages). You can open up the passages at dinner time, just before bed, or as you are baby-sitting your grandchildren.

# SETTING THE SCENE

The purpose of this series is to build upon what we have learned from Romans 8.

- How do we defend this faith we now enjoy?
- If it is true that there is now no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus, can we defend it?
- If it is true that there is nothing that can separate us from the love of God, we want people to have the opportunity to know this.

As we are reminded in 1 Peter 3:15-16, "But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against your good behaviour in Christ may be ashamed of their slander."

#### SO WHAT IS APOLOGETICS?

Apologetics is a defence of the faith so we might move forward with the gospel. It helps to break down barriers so the truth of the gospel, which is the power of God to salvation, might be delivered.

## STUDY 1

#### **Q: HOW CAN YOU KNOW THE BIBLE IS TRUE?**

2 Timothy 3:16-17; Luke 1:1-4

### Leaders resources: Confronting Christianity – chapter 6, How can you take the Bible literally.

1. Understanding the question: What are some of the reasons people question whether the Bible is true?

The Bible is full of contradictions and discrepancies. The Bible is full of violence, genocide, prejudice, and injustice, often commanded by God—and it's been used by Christians to justify more violence and oppression. The Bible's descriptions of nature and natural history are hopelessly at odds with science. The Bible was written by ancient and primitive people, and has no value to modern people anymore. Christians can't even agree on what it's saying, so who cares if it's true or not.

2. Challenging the question: What arguments or evidence is there to challenge the view that the bible is not true?

The Bible is written over a long time and is cohesive as a whole. Many authors can show God is over all of it. Historically, it's claims can be verified by archaeology, eye witnesses and observation of the accuracy of this critique of humanity.

- 3. Resolving the question: How would you introduce the gospel from this question?
- 4. What Bible passages support your answer?

### DID YOU KNOW.....

No archaeological discovery has contradicted anything in the Bible, e.g. a recent discovery of coins with Pontius Pilate's name engraved on them, the Pool of Siloam, & "the Pavement", all are mentioned in the Bible.

Records from other historians outside the Bible, such as Pliny, Josephus and Tacitus, support what is written in the Bible.

Translations and versions of the Bible are direct translations of the original language and text (Old Testament in Hebrew, New Testament in Greek) not "translations of translations of translations".

# STUDY 2

#### Q: HOW CAN YOU SAY THERE IS ONLY ONE FAITH?

Colossians 1:15-20; John 14:6

### Leaders resources: Confronting Christianity – chapter 3, How can you say there is only one true faith?

1. Understanding the question: In your experience what are some of the reasons people have with the claim that there is only one legitimate faith?

Perhaps it is that people like choice. Perhaps there are good people in any faith community. Other faiths have ideas we ought to take seriously (this is true and a good posture for Christians to assume).

2. Challenging the question: What arguments or evidence is there to challenge the view that there is only one faith?

It is not just about the one path but also each religion can contain an aspect of the truth. This too is false.

"... When examined more closely, attempting to persuade others to change their beliefs is a sign of respect. You are treating them as thinking agents with the ability to decide what they believe, not just products of their cultural environment. We should not be offended when people challenge our beliefs: we should be flattered." Rebecca McLaughlin page 49.

Talk about problem of truth. What is your truth? Is the truth and something being true that same?

McLaughlin suggests the following headings to deal with this:

- o Conversion
- o Problem of ethics
- o Problem of monotheism
- o Problem of Jesus
- 3. How would you introduce the gospel from this question?
- 4. What bible passages would you use to support your answer?

## STUDY 4

#### **Q: DOES RELIGION CAUSE VIOLENCE?**

Luke 23:26-38

#### Leaders resources: ConfrontingChristianity.Chapter5byRebeccaMcLaughlin. For the love of God – Centre for Public Christianity

1. Understanding the question: What are some of the reasons people ask the question, does religion cause violence?

History is littered with violence such as the crusades or Spanish inquisition. Perhaps people think these days that the church is causing harm with its view on social issues such as gender marriage.

2. Challenging the question: What arguments or evidence is there to challenge the view that religion causes violence?

Unbelieivng cultures have experienced high levels of violence that is not in the name of any faith. The problem may not be institutions or organisations as much the humans in them.

It is right to acknowledge that violence has been perpetrated in the name of God or gods. The challenge is to work toward the root cause of the problem, that is, sinful human beings.

3. Resolving the question: How would you introduce the gospel from this question?
